

Pre-Induction Task

Before you begin your courses at the Sixth Form, Bolton, you are required to complete the following tasks to spark your curiosity about English Language. Child Language Acquisition is one of the major topics in this subject and focuses on children's language development – from the early stages of language – to Primary School level.

Did you know?

All babies are born with the ability to learn language. All children - no matter which language their parents speak - learn a language in the same way.

Task 1: Look at the video below – under the Extension Task - of the mother teaching her little girl how to speak. Does the little girl accurately repeat her mother's words? Why do you think there are inconsistencies in her speech?

Extension Task: Parents/caregivers use a method called 'Baby Talk' – known as 'Parentese'/'Motherese' or Caregiver's Speech. Have you noticed how the mother speaks differently to a child, when compared to another adult or older child?
