

SANS-SERIF TYPOGRAPHY: CLEAN, LEGIBLE TYPEFACES REPLACED DECORATIVE SERIFS FOR MODERN READABILITY.

GEOMETRIC SHAPES: BASIC FORMS LIKE CIRCLES, SQUARES, AND TRIANGLES CREATE ABSTRACT, SYMBOLIC DESIGNS.
