CAREERS TEAM

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Our highly experienced and dedicated careers team is on hand to provide specialist careers advice and guidance to students throughout the year. We organise a number of career directed events each year where students have the opportunity to attend workshops, receive one-to-ones and participate in seminars from a variety of universities, employers and alumni.

Our careers programme is designed to embed the career development skills set out within the CDI's Career Development Framework. It's purpose is to support all students in the planning of their career, so that they leave The Sixth Form with the skills, knowledge and confidence needed for the next step of their career journey.



We provide students with multiple opportunities to:

- Develop self-awareness of their skills, strengths and interests in relation to higher education and career options.
- Research their career ideas and HE goals.
- Engage with employers, universities and apprenticeship providers.
- Understand labour market information and its impact on the choices that they make.
- Develop and identify key employability skills so that they have the confidence to demonstrate these during the recruitment process, both for employment and university places.
- Explore enrichment opportunities outside of the curriculum.

As a Sixth Form we actively encourage parents and carers to support their son/daughter with their career planning and exploration. Our website contains a range of online careers resources to facilitate this support and as a Sixth Form, we host a number of parents and carers events during the academic year, which provide further information on post-sixth form progression options.

Gatsby Benchmarks

In 2017, the Government published a new National Careers Strategy. The aim of this strategy was to raise the aspirations of all young people and improve social mobility, by ensuring all students have access to a quality careers programme. The quality of this programme is measured against 8 Gatsby benchmarks:

- **1.** A stable careers programme.
- **2.** Learning from career and labour market information.
- 3. Addressing the needs of each pupil.
- 4. Linking curriculum learning to careers.
- **5.** Encounters with employers and employees.
- **6.** Experiences of the workplace.
- Encounters with further and higher education.
- 8. Personal guidance.

YEAR 12 CAREERS PROGRAMME

THROUGHOUT THE ACADEMIC YEAR

WHAT / HOW

Within each subject area, students are provided with numerous opportunities to explore a range of careers and labour market information, in relation to their subject(s) and career aspirations:

This includes guest speakers from higher education and employment, as well as trips which give students experiences of a variety of workplace settings.

WHAT / HOW

1:1 Guidance appointments with our team of qualified careers advisers:

Students can visit the Careers Hub on the ground floor to book an appointment or email careers@bolton-sfc.ac.uk.

WHAT / HOW

Professional Growth Programme:

This mandatory programme incorporates online and 'live' employability sessions that will help them to develop key skills in preparation for the world of work. In the online sessions, students sign up to a career pathway of interest and undertake a project designed by pathway specific employers. Students also have the opportunity to gain Microsoft qualifications, build their online professional profile and more. In the live sessions, students will gain skills in communication, team work and leadership.

WHAT / HOW

Subject specific academies, such as the Science Academy, Futures Academy and the Law Society:

Available across different departments, in relation to student's subject areas and career aspirations.

WHAT / HOW

Enrichment activities, such as volunteering, Student Council, Debating Society, First Aid and Duke of Edinburgh:

Students are actively encouraged to sign up to the many enrichment activities available at The Sixth Form. Students are provided with details of these activities at enrolment. An enrichment day takes place during the Autumn term, providing students with a 'taster' of the enrichment activities on offer.

WHAT / HOW

Opportunities for work experience:

Specific work experience weeks for A Level and Vocational A Level students are set out in the academic calendar. Students can also get involved in the other work-related activities that we hold during the academic year, such as Workplace 'Safaris' and Live Project Briefs.

AUTUMN TERM

WHAT / HOW

Career Pathways:

Information on student career goals and intended destinations is gathered to identify key trends and gaps in careers provision and to help us plan career enrichment activities.

WHAT / HOW

Students are made aware of the careers support available and how to book a careers appointment:

Shown introduction video from careers team via tutor groups.



WHAT / HOW

Careers service promoted to parents/ carers as part of the Welcome Evening event (September):

Presentation provides overview of the support provided by the Careers Team, including information on the Professional Growth Programme and work experience.

WHAT / HOW

Eligible students are provided with information about a range of widening participation programmes, such as the Manchester Access Programme, Lancaster Access Programme, MMU First Generation Scheme, and the SMF Aspiring Professionals Programme:

These are promoted via the Careers TEAMs platform and guest speakers from these programmes deliver information sessions about the programme content and how to apply.

WHAT / HOW

Team Building and Leadership Skills:

In tutor group, students will develop important employability skills around team building and leadership. These are the skills that are necessary to succeed both in college and in any workplace setting.

SPRING TERM

WHAT / HOW

Make your Mark:

Within tutor group students will take part in debating activities in order to build on their communication and public speaking skills. Building confidence in this area will help students prepare for the recruitment processes for both apprenticeships, employment and university places.

WHAT / HOW

Annual Careers Day:

Students have the opportunity to attend a selection of career insight talks and university taster lectures. A careers and HE marketplace is available throughout the day, for students to access information on university and employment options.

WHAT / HOW

Challenging Stereotypes:

In tutor group, students explore the impact of stereotyping across different groups within society, including how career planning can be impacted by attitudes to stereotyping.





SUMMER TERM

WHAT / HOW

Parents HE Information Evening:

Guest presenters of HE institutions provide parents with information on University life, UCAS and student finance.

WHAT / HOW

Interview Skills:

Students will take part in a range of practical activities in tutor group where they will work on and develop their interview technique in preparation for future interviews for jobs, apprenticeships and competitive university courses.

WHAT / HOW

Finance, Budgeting and Fraud:

Delivered in tutor group, this session raises awareness of the importance of managing finances, including the importance of this at university and/or when in employment.

CAREERS

WHAT / HOW

Career Planning: UCAS, degree apprenticeships and employment:

Students begin to research and plan their post-sixth form options within tutor group, including universities and higher/degree level apprenticeships.

WHAT / HOW

Tutor Group - UCAS sessions:

Students begin to complete the UCAS application process during the final tutor groups of the summer term, including draft writing of their UCAS personal statement.



YEAR 13 CAREERS PROGRAMME

THROUGHOUT THE ACADEMIC YEAR

WHAT / HOW

Within each subject area, students are provided with numerous opportunities to explore a range of careers and Labour Market Information, in relation to their subject(s) and career aspirations:

This includes guest speakers from higher education and employment as well as trips which give students experiences of a variety of workplace settings.

WHAT / HOW

1:1 Guidance appointments with our team of qualified careers advisers:

Students can visit the Careers Hub on the ground floor to book an appointment.

WHAT / HOW

Work Experience Award:

Throughout their time at college, all students have the opportunity to undertake work experience. Depending on the amount of hours completed, they can achieve a Bronze, Sliver, Gold, Platinum or Diamond award. By the start of second year, we would expect all students to have achieved a silver award and to be progressing onto gold and beyond. More information can be found on the careers section of the college website.

WHAT / HOW

Enrichment activities, such as volunteering, Student Council, Debating Society and First Aid:

Students are actively encouraged to sign up to the many enrichment activities available at The Sixth Form. An enrichment day takes place during the Autumn term, providing students with a 'taster,' of the enrichment activities on offer.

WHAT / HOW

Professional Growth Programme:

During second year, students continue with the online Professional Growth Programme, undertaking modules on recruitment and personal statement writing along with further opportunities to develop Microsoft skills. Students will also take part in modules that will help develop important revision techniques, academic writing skills and resilience as they start to prepare for their final exams.

WHAT / HOW


Apprenticeship Academy:

Students who have expressed an interest in securing a degree apprenticeship, can sign up for additional advice and support via our Apprenticeship Academy. Including application support, mock interviews and assessment centre preparation.

WHAT / HOW

1:1 interview preparation and support:

Students can book appointments with the careers team to practice for both university admissions interviews and apprenticeship/employment interviews.



AUTUMN TERM

WHAT / HOW

Updated intended destination data is used to inform our second year careers programme:

This is gathered via tutor groups and also during 1:1 careers appointments.

WHAT / HOW

UCAS, Personal Statements, Apprenticeships and progression pathways:

The focus for second-year students in tutor groups is to ensure a plan is in place for the end of Sixth Form. Students receive support and guidance from progress tutors with the completion of their UCAS applications and applications for jobs and apprenticeships.

WHAT / HOW

'Every Learner is a Leader':

In tutor group, students complete a behaviours and drivers questionnaire to understand motivations and habits to help the learner frame their behaviours, goals and actions and understand more about themselves for directing their actions and decisions in the right direction.

WHAT / HOW

1:1 Personal Statement Support:

A range of university admissions experts provide 1:1 appointments to offer advice on personal statements. This runs in conjunction with and compliments the personal statement support provided by The Sixth Form tutors and the careers teams.



SPRING TERM

WHAT / HOW

- 1. Personal Budgeting and Managing your Finances.
- 2. Student Finance and Accessing Bursary Schemes.
- 3. Progression Routes:

Delivered in tutor group, this session raises awareness of the importance of managing finances, including the importance of this at university and/or when in employment. The second session looks specifically at the student finance system as well as the student scholarship/bursary landscape.

WHAT / HOW

Transition Support:

In tutor group, the focus moves to progression and ensuring students have plans in place for when they leave The Sixth Form.

SUMMER TERM

WHAT / HOW

Ongoing support from B6 Careers:

As students prepare to leave The Sixth Form the B6 careers team are still available to support students who need it. Students can arrange 1:1s with the careers team to discuss any concerns they have around their transition to university, apprenticeships or employment. Students who have not managed to secure a job and have decided not to apply to university can attend our employability fair which is attended by training providers, FE colleges and external support agencies such as Connexions, to find out more about their options and the people who can help them after completing their studies with us.
